Law and Language in Scandinavia

Law and Language is attracting growing attention in Scandinavia, but is not a unified field. The statement by Peter Tiersma (2008), seems to hold true for Scandinavian research as well: "...the problem here is not lack of interest. Rather, it is that there are number of different groups producing work in this area, often with different background and interest."

In this presentation we focus on the current state of the art of the field of Law and Language in Scandinavia. The presenters are members of the steering committee of the interdisciplinary research network RELINE. One aim of the Network has been to map ongoing research in the Nordic countries, and to establish a common framework for interdisciplinary studies in the field. This effort is presented in a forthcoming volume covering four central subjects: the use of legal language, language as persuasion in a rhetorical sense, the hidden influence of legal language, and the role of language in legal interpretation.

The dual purpose of this presentation is to give examples from different areas of Law and Language studies in Scandinavia and to illustrate that the field is ambiguous and covers very diverse perspectives, which not only co-exist, but also benefit from joint investigation. We will discuss the latter claim after presenting three lines of research. Anne Lise Kjær will give a talk on the discursive implementation of ECTHR judgments in the case law of the Scandinavian supreme courts, Lin Adrian will present research on the language of mediated agreements in Denmark and Norway demonstrating how legal language is reproduced in this informal setting. And Jonas Gabrielsen will discuss the term 'rhetoric' in a juridical context, arguing that rhetoric is understood in at least three different ways in Scandinavian research.
